people! Last year when I was in a different kindergarten room a little girl asked me my name and I told her, 'Nancy.' She thought for a minute with her finger to her lips and said, 'Oh, like Nancy Pelosi!'"

What accomplishments are you most proud of during your tenure with the agency?

"I think it's the connections and the relationships that I have developed with building staff and my AEA colleagues."

What have you liked most about working at GWAEA?

"I have always been incredibly fortunate to work with amazing AEA colleagues. We created our own little support system and helped each other get through challenging times and enjoyed celebrating the ""fun stuff"". I have also worked with so many dedicated and caring LEA staff, teachers, associates, and administrators.

I also have appreciated the opportunities that I have had over the years to develop my skills - mediation training, being part of the CISM team, working as a behavior coach, and teaching Youth Mental Health First Aid. These are just a few that come to mind."

refused and chose the hallway upstairs instead). I worked as a building rep at Cedar Rapids Washington for a number of years and loved my work there - and had many fun stories working with the staff and students in that building. It is strange to look back on your career and to think about how quickly it all seems to have gone!"

What accomplishments are you most proud of during your tenure with the agency?

"I am most proud of helping to build the SEBH structures currently in place at the agency. When I was first assigned to SEBH work in 2011-12, I was assigned as the management link to two staff - one Challenging Behavior team member (Lindsey Stangeland) and one PBIS Coordinator (Tammy Beener). There was also a new SEBT (Special Ed Behavior Team) pilot that was connected to a different manager. During the 2012-13 year, I became the link to the SEBT (now called Behavior Coaches) and we began collaborating with all three teams and working to build a system of support. We met regularly with the Autism team (ABC Planning) and worked to understand the messages and professional learning that each group was providing to our LEAs at the time. In the areas where there were discrepancies, we worked together to align our messages and

In addition to SEBH, I am also proud of the work that I have done in Mediation. I have been a Mediator at GWAEA since 2014-15. During that time, we have come to consensus in all of our mediations except for one. I have worked with many great people in this work, including my co-mediators Paul Kiburz, Jill Ries, Janel Lesan, Danielle Donnelly and Tim Salmon. Mediation has been very rewarding in that you are coming to the table with two parties who are at very different places and working to bring them to agreement so they can move forward. I really enjoy it!

I also cannot overlook the CISM team that I have been fortunate to be a management link to for nine years (four years in the past and five years most currently). 'Team Awesome' is made up of so many dedicated professionals who give of themselves every time we are called out to support a crisis. This is above and beyond their 'normal work' and therefore these team members are so dedicated to helping provide stability in traumatic times. Our leadership team is so amazing and supportive of one another and I am so

grateful to have been a part of building this team and our shared leadership capacity."

What have you liked most about working at GWAEA?

"I know it is cliché, but the PEOPLE! No matter my role or the work I am doing, I am always surrounded by passionate, caring and brilliant people. That has been amazing!"

As you reflect on your career at GWAEA, what one word best describes your work and why?

"Fulfilling. As I look back, I was given so many opportunities to help me learn and grow, and I appreciated them all!"

Are there any other reflections you'd like to add?

"GWAEA has been an incredible place to work. There are so many opportunities and possibilities. I have personally been assigned to eight different districts and had nine different supervisors through the years. Are there any interesting stories you'd like to share from school districts in which you've worked or within the AEA?

"So many stories! I have taught many breathing techniques to staff and children over the years. One time when I returned the following week to a center after I had taught breathing lessons to the preschool class, a boy came up to me and said, with the biggest smile on his face, 'I made up a new breathing idea!' He put his arms around me and took

CHRISTOPHER SOLDAT

"I began working at GWAEA in August 2004. I have served as a Science Curriculum Consultant all these years. Our work at the VAST Center involves supporting schools with their science curriculum, instruction, and assessment. The VAST Center has five core pillars for transforming science education, which include: research-based, inquiry-driven curriculum; professional development; materials support; administrative and community support; and appropriate assessment.

We have seen a change in our field with Iowa's adoption of the Next Generation Science Standards/Iowa CORE in 2013. We have become more involved in advocating for High-Quality Instructional Materials (HQIM), coupled with high-quality professional learning and three-dimensional assessments."

Are there any interesting stories you'd like to share from school districts in which you've worked or within the AFA?

"I worked with area schools with the Enhancing Education Through Technology (E2T2) grant to plan and implement Problem-Based Learning units of instruction. We integrated GPS and GIS software to develop data surrounding local phenomena to help students construct scientific explanations for their investigations We built this initial start into a three-year grant entitled Inquiry GIS for Science Teaching (IGISST). IGISST developed teachers with Earth Science content and pedagogy. Our summer field experiences included field experiences in various parts of the state coupled with a week at the Okoboji Regents Lakeside Laboratory and a summer geology field experience in Crested Butte, Colorado."

What accomplishments are you most proud of during your tenure with the agency?

"I am very proud of our Math-Science Partnership grants which provided over 300 hours of professional learning opportunities for participating teachers over a three-year span. We have partnered with the University of Iowa Science Education Center, the Lawrence Hall of Science, University of California, Berkeley, the Iowa Department of Natural Resources and our local school districts to provide intensive support of the implementation of reform science instruction."

What have you liked most about working at GWAEA?

"My greatest joy is working in K-12 science classrooms with students. I enjoy asking what questions are they trying to answer and what is making sense to them. I enjoy asking teachers what parts of their instruction engage their learners, how they find out what students know and how will that affect what they will do in the next lesson."
